OHS Delivery - Update of Initiatives

Jobs' Skills, Training and Labour (JSTL) empowers its' Safe, Fair and Health Workplaces division through the Occupational Health and Safety branch to establish policies, educational approaches and compliance measures in support of the prevention principles that build and strengthen health and safety at Alberta work sites. This session will provide an overview of results in relation to the newest OHS initiatives: Proactive programs, Ticketing, Administrative Penalty Systems (TAPS, Investigations, Quality Training & Development (QTD), and Partnerships.

Reportable Work-Related Motor Vehicle Incidents in Alberta

MVIs fatalities are the leading cause of workplace incident death. Approximately 20% of all work-related fatalities are from motor vehicle incidents (MVIs). This presentation will:

- review OHS legal requirements of employers,
- review Alberta OHS Program's response MVIs (investigations and surveillance), and
- highlight preliminary findings on the significance, characteristics and risk factors within work-related MVIs in Alberta.

How Do We Collaborate on Reducing Occupational Injury Impacts: A Canadian Case Study

Every day in Canada, 3 people are killed at work with almost a million workers injured annually on the job. This equates to approximately one compensated time-loss injury for every two minutes worked. Factoring in both direct and indirect costs, the total annual cost of occupational injuries to the Canadian economy is now estimated to be greater than \$19 billion. In the area of Occupational Health and Safety, The Canadian Red Cross has helped to establish a National Workplace Injury Reduction Collaborative, a stakeholder group composed of regulators, educators, and experts from the occupational health and safety sector as well as health care. The overall goal of this initiative is to establish a multi-disciplinary group of stakeholders focused on further mitigating workplace injury through evidence-based messaging and training, networking and resource sharing. It has been identified that there is a need to modernize the existing training criteria and program elements. Developing a standardized curriculum without reference to a specific proprietary program would be a key element to develop a consistent, systematic and effective training program across the country. The National Workplace Injury reduction collaborative is playing a leadership role in the establishment of a competency framework for First Aid training in Canada. We will share how we got to this place, and where we are going with it.

Resistance to Change: Avoiding New Frontiers

As humans we have become creatures of habit, loving the known and avoiding the challenges that may bring the unknown and unexpected. We often cling to habits and practices that are known to be unsafe or contrary to evidence-based research for the simple reason of maintaining status quo. This has been ever apparent for Kris during his 15 years in the medical and pre-hospital fields, both civilian and military. During this time he has seen practices remain in place due to the lack of knowing how to move forward or a resistance to do so. In this talk he will examine examples of resistance to change in practices, discuss the barriers to change, and talk about strategies that have been used by the organizations he works with to break through resistance.

The Price We Pay? Managing Stress in the Workplace

In our modern society stress and fatigue are often seen as the price we pay to get ahead in life. As the safety profession evolves to better address multiple aspects of health and safety, stress and fatigue are being recognized as key issues. Recent research has provided a better understanding into how and why stress and fatigue pose such significant risks and recent industry practices, such as the 2013 CSA Z1003 Psychological Health and Safety Standard, show industries' drive to address these factors. Stress and fatigue are often interrelated in their impact on an organization. The science behind fatigue and the multiple causes within the workplace will be examined to create a stronger understanding of how to mitigate this issue. Theories of what causes us stress in the workplace and how this stress can directly impact our health and safety will be reviewed to recognize how to better structure workplaces. This presentation will provide strategies and resources for assessing fatigue and stress risk factors within your organization. Best practices for mitigating these issues will then be shared forward. Specific examples on how to manage stress and fatigue both organizationally and personally will be provided.

This presentation is a "how to" on investigating Bullying, Sexual Harassment and Violence in Union and Non-Union Work Environments. With a focus on Western Canada, the presenters will walk participants through the most common investigative pit-falls and provide clear operational guidance on how to keep their organizations on the straight and narrow.

Specific OHS requirements for employers exist in some circumstances, Public Health requirements in others and sometimes the jurisdictions appear uncertain. Partnerships News

Partnerships In Injury Reduction is a great example of how government, labor and industry can work together to improve occupational health and safety for Albertans. We are a non-regulatory, province wide prevention program sponsored co-operatively by government, labor, and industry. Together we encourage and assist employers with the implementation of health and safety management systems at their work sites. Partnerships use a strategic approach to program development in an effort to meet the emerging needs of industry and government. Through this process, and consultation with stakeholders, feedback has been provided toward program direction. This session will provide an update of current and new initiatives.

Session 113 | Donald MacDonald Cheatre

Musculoskeletal Injury Interventions — Methods to Improve Return on Investment and Reduce Injuries

Musculoskeletal injuries (MSI) are recognized as common type of injury. Between 2010 and 2014, 49% of all lost time claims (LTC) in Alberta were sprains and strains. Part 14 of the Occupational Health and Safety Code in Alberta is specifically aimed are reducing the hazards associated with manual handling, and MSIs. Organizations are investing money in training and new equipment yet MSI's continue to a prevalent issue in industry. Common barriers to success will be reviewed. Methods to have success reducing in MSIs and improve return on investment in industry will be presented.

Session 114 | Dr. Thomas Barker 🙃 D.C. Coleman

The Healthy Workplaces for Healing Professions Project: A Progress Report

In this presentation we will present preliminary findings of our project, and also share the processes we have developed for effective community-based research. The Healthy Workplaces for Healing Professions project aims to help administrators, supervisors, and front-line staff in the human services sector workforce of Alberta to identify, communicate, and mitigate the stress hazards of human-service work. It aims to do so by conducting research into the nature of stress hazards and by providing the government of Alberta, Workers Compensation Board, and accreditation agencies with data needed to allow for informed policy. At the same time, the project aims to increase the capacity of the workforce to respond to stress hazards on the job so that stress can be minimized. It will do this with a three-year plan to 1) research stress hazards, 2) mobilize information (training) on how to mitigate stress hazards, and 3) measure the degree of culture change in the workforce. The end result will be a workforce with increased capacity to respond to stress hazards and clear guidelines for government and insurance agencies to address stress hazards.

A Holistic Approach to Security

If you were to define the word security, it is quite likely you could conjure-up a variety of different applications and functions. In essence, security has become so intrinsic into every aspect of our daily lives that we occasionally become oblivious to it, or how it should be applied. Security is not just about managing risks but more so how we perceive and respond to these risks, albeit at home or at the workplace. While an active shooter event is absolutely horrific, spending \$300 for a Disney adorned bullet proof backpack is not necessarily the way to go to protect our children. The most detrimental hindrance to security is not a lack funding or resources or even corporate buy-in, but rather operating in isolation or a vacuum. The cybercriminals and jihadists seem to understand this holistic approach and are now, more than ever before, joining forces and coordinating their attacks. If we are truly serious about our security and safe communities, then we too must continuously look for ways to join forces.

Psychological Safety—The Next Step in Building a Culture of Health, Safety and Performance

Employers in Canada and many other countries face mounting pressures to find better ways to reduce employee health and safety risks – and costs. These challenges are best addressed by viewing healthy and safe employees as a strategic advantage. This positive approach to risk reduction is guided by a workplace vision that sets mental and physical wellbeing as corporate goals. Evidence-based best practices point to four actions that OHS professionals can take to move their organization in this direction. First, expand occupational health and safety management systems to promote psychological safety. Second, collaborate with wellness and HR professionals to develop integrated approaches to employee wellbeing. Third, make full use of OHS and HR metrics to demonstrate connections between health, safety and performance. And fourth, never lose sight of fact that your organization's culture – the value it places on people – is the foundation for healthy, safe and high-performing workplace.

Session 203 | Dr. Philip Bigelow 🎧 Baron Shaughnessy

Reducing Seated Vibration in Truck Drivers to Reduce Fatigue and Back Pain

Fatigue is a major problem for truck drivers and is a leading causative factor in motor vehicle collisions. Truck drivers also report frequent back pain and lost time due to back injury. Whole body vibration has been linked to both driver fatigue and low back pain and is a focus of this presentation. In addition to providing the latest information on the relationships of whole body vibration with fatigue and back pain, the findings from a study involving active vibration-reducing truck seat technologies will be discussed. The observational cohort study examined differences in vibration exposures, fatigue and back pain in long-haul drivers with and without active vibration-reducing seats. Measurements were taken over the duration of long-haul trips (2 to 7 day) and included floor and seat vibration, self-reported back pain, and objective measures of vigilance and fatigue.

Wellness Amongst Child Care Providers in Rural and Urban Southern Alberta

Work-related musculoskeletal disorders (MSDs) are persistent amongst North America's working population, with high injury costs, personal toll, and impact on health services and society. While large industries can take organised efforts to reduce MSDs, interventions amongst smaller workplaces are infrequent.

Childcare falls into this gap – physical and psychosocial factors associated with MSDs risk are frequent in childcare, with higher workload and poorer health reported for childcare workers over blue-collar, white-collar, and elder care workers. But in 2012, Alberta childcare operations with reportable earnings averaged less than 11 full-time employees; many smaller childcare operations fell below recording standards at all. Currently available industry resources do include health and safety information, but tend to emphasise acute injury and health concerns, with corresponding policies and procedures. Identifying and controlling the chronic MSDs risks amongst this workforce has logistical challenges, demanding a targeted, evidence-based intervention partnered and tested in Alberta's geographic and socioeconomic childcare framework.

This presentation will discuss the development and evidence from a targeted industry-wide intervention, with practical examples for delivering evidence-based ergonomics to small- and medium-sized businesses.

Is Gwyneth Paltrow Wrong About Everything? When Celebrity Culture and Science Clash


Society's perceptions of beauty, health, success and happiness are framed by a popular culture that is increasingly disconnected from reality.
